Two yellow-fruited Cornus

SUSYN ANDREWS writes about unusual forms of dogwood that may deserve to be better known.

Cornus kousa 'Xanthocarpa' first came to my attention from a note by Philippe de Spoelberch (2012), who saw it in the Botanisher Garten Solingen. "Cornus kousa aux fruits jaunes dont tout le monde a gouté la chair et ainsi nettoyé quelques graines. Ce fut le doux de la visite et, bien sûr, on se demande si les semis éventuels donneront des arbustes à fruit jaunes." This was the first time I had heard of this cultivar and there is no material in the Kew herbarium. Mary Forrest (1985) apparently saw it at Mount Congreve, Co Waterford in Ireland, a garden which has just passed into the hands of the National Botanic Gardens, Glasnevin, Dublin. Gerd Krüssmann (1984) described it as having light green foliage and yellow fruit. Howard (1961) in his registration list of Cornus noted that C. kousa 'Xanthocarpa' originated in Holland and it was first listed by Krüssmann (1960). No additional information was given in Krüssmann (1984).

Apparently, there is also a yellow-fruited *C. florida*, which was first described from material collected in Saluda, North Carolina in 1919. In the Kew herbarium, we have a sheet collected by Miss L. C. Wilcox on 21 October 1919, from the above location. This taxon was described by Alfred Rehder (1921) as *C. florida* f. *xanthocarpa*. At the same time Rehder reported another

sighting near Oyster Bay, Long Island by the nurserymen, Hicks & Co. of Westbury, New York.

According to Cappiello & Shadow (2005), f. *xanthocarpa* usually has yellowish twigs, pale foliage and yellow fruit. They do note, however, that "there are some standouts floating around that warrant considerable evaluation effort." Unfortunately, they illustrate the flowers and not the fruit!

H. W. Haynes of the Packhorse Farm Nursery, Tansley, Matlock in Derbyshire did stock f. *xanthocarpa* [as 'Xanthocarpa'] for several years and it was listed in the *RHS Plant Finder* from 2004-2008. As it did not perform well, Mr Haynes deleted this taxon from his catalogue.
